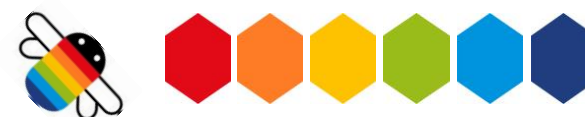
How is the Primary PE & Sport Premium spent at Farsley Farfield Primary School?

The funding is invested in various ways and the impact is closely monitored by gaining feedback from all stakeholders, assessment of children's skills and it is evidenced as part of the Sainsbury's Annual School Games Assessment. 

The balance of funds will be spent on additional staffing for PE lessons (e.g. a member of staff to drive to Rawdon Tennis Club), replenishment of equipment (including new tennis and tchoukball equipment), some CPD, attendance at the Active Schools Annual Conference and a small contribution to the school minibus fund.
