
Curriculum News February 2016

Museums are important!

Children in Year 3 and in Year 5 went by No. 72 bus to the Leeds City Museum at the end of last half term. Year 3 attended an Ancient Egypt workshop and Year 5 experienced a brand-new workshop relating to Anglo-Saxons. It is sad to see museums closing across the country as a result of cuts, so it is important that we make good use of those museums and galleries that Leeds and Bradford manage to keep open.

So far this school year we have visited Thwaite Mills, Leeds Gallery, Abbey House Museum, the Media Museum and Cartwright Hall in Bradford. We were due to go to Armley Mills Museum but it is currently closed after the flooding.

Politicians in 'not quite telling the whole truth' shocker!

Despite assurances that suggest otherwise, education is not immune to the public sector cuts and, along with other schools, we are having to make savings of about £100,000 per year to meet additional costs to the school due to changes to NI, pensions, unfunded pay rises and the living wage initiative. This equates to savings of just over 5%. This will be achieved by reducing non-SEN support assistants, changes to the PPA model and some reductions in other services such as mentoring. We will also expect to slightly reduce the teaching bill through some agreed reductions in hours and through a targeted recruitment strategy. Whilst this isn't good news, we are confident that we can deliver these savings without compromising high quality classroom provision or the rich curriculum offer of the school.
