The staff have been working hard over the summer developing the concept of 'The Farfield Learning Hive' which pulls together key aspects of a child's development in our school and will be the basis of new rewards and sanctions systems in school.

We will be making use of a new online system called 'Class Dojo' which will also make your child's summary behaviour records available to you online. We will be writing/emailing you about this again soon.

Watch out for the 'Learning Hive' graphics appearing across the whole school over the coming months. Weekly ethos statements, linked to the six key 'Learning Hive' themes, will be promoted widely and shared with families. We hope that home and school can use a common language with the children to encourage the positive behaviours and good learning habits that we all want.

Presentation policy

Another key focus this year is to improve the standard of presentation in children's work. We are publishing key standards and expectations for each year group. Some children might struggle to meet these expectations at first but we will be there to help them every step of the way.



Exciting IT Developments

During the holidays, the ICT suite was converted into a huge new classroom and Miss Dormand and 5/6D are its lucky first occupants. We now have mobile IT, with a trolley full of new laptops in each building and a significant number of iPad minis.

Work on the final part of our expansion should begin next Easter with a new classroom being built in the area currently occupied by the tatty green modular building.

We have had a new, robust high capacity wireless network installed in August that should provide the infrastructure that we require. The council, as part of our expansion agreement, has funded most of this project and we expect our use of IT in the coming year to be even more imaginative and exciting. Mrs Carney is going to be recruiting 'Digital Leaders' from amongst the children to support the school with this. Later in the year, we will showcase our work with iPads for parents and discuss the possibility of 1:1 scheme.

Training Day

Our next training day is on **Wednesday 2nd October** when staff will be spending a full day on using the iPads to enhance teaching and learning from the internationally renowned trainer David Kirtlan.

Year 6 SATS Results

Last year's Y6 children did very well in their SATS tests. Our performance compared to other schools will be published later this year, but the headlines are:

- **88%**, **81%** and **84%** met or exceeded the expected level 4 standards in reading, writing and maths respectively.
- **65%**, **26%** and **51%** met or exceeded above average level 5 standards in reading, writing and maths respectively.
- In the new Spelling, Grammar and Grammar tests, **74%** met the expected level 4 standard, whilst a superb **60%** achieved level 5.
- Well over 90% of children made the expected 2 levels of progress.

The number of children attaining level 5 standards is particularly impressive and we expect the 'value added' statistics for this cohort to be excellent.

There was a successful SATs boycott in 2010. From 2013, the government changed the literacy testing and there is no longer an overall English grade for Y6 pupils.

We will be looking for even more science-based educational visits and we will be seeing how our ipads can make learning about science, and communicating our ideas, even more exciting and fun!

We will also be part of the 'Think Science' network of six schools working with the University of Leeds and the National Science Learning Centre based in Sheffield.
