I have been very proud of the new class blogs and the super professional practice that they showcase.

My staff now deserve their break. I would like to put on record my gratitude for all their hard work and I would also like to thank parents and governors for all their support this year. Have a great summer,

Academic success across school

Children and staff have been working hard and making good progress.



<u>KS1 (Year 2)</u>

Our KS1 SATS results (Year 2) are the best for many years and much higher than 2013.

90% of children achieved the national expectation of 2b or better in reading, 87% in writing and 88% in maths. 22% of children attained very high 3b standards in reading, 10% achieved the standard in writing and 17% in maths. Those children who haven't quite reached 2b standards have nevertheless generally tried hard and have made pleasing progress. It is particularly positive to see that this cohort of boys has achieved very well.

Congratulations to all the children, their families and KS1 staff.

These infant standards, especially those attaining 2b or better, are likely to be well above national averages.

<u>KS2 (Year 6)</u>



It has been another good year for end of KS2 SATs too.

The percentage of Y6 children reaching the expected standards of level 4 have increased in all areas compared to 2013: 92%, 87% and 87% in reading, writing and maths respectively.

The percentages of children attaining level 5 remains high in reading (over 53%), rose a little in writing (to 28%) but fell in maths to 25% - our main disappointment. Lots of children attained 4a or 4a+ but just missed out on the level 5 score that we had hoped for. A few children attained level 6 standards in writing and maths. 75% of children attained the expected level or better in the new Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar test, with half of this cohort exceeding this and attaining level 5. Over 90% of children made the expected two levels of progress since Year 2 (similar to last year).



Well done to all the children and the KS2 staff. Most of these results are likely to be higher than national averages.

Progress in years 1, 3, 4 and 5 continues to be generally good according to our internal assessment. Those children who may not have made the expected progress will generally be targeted for additional support next year.

The governors, senior leadership team and I will do more analysis of this data in the autumn term when national and local benchmarks have been published.

The charge for KS2 meals will remain £2.00 for a tasty, 'home-cooked' two course hot meal prepared to high nutritional standards. We would strongly recommend the school meals to everyone - why not give them a try in September?
