Academisation?

The title of this newsletter is 'Curriculum News' and that is what I would like to focus on: children and their learning. Instead the government has pledged to force every school to become an academy by 2020 (or 2022). Primary schools, in particular, have shown very little appetite for academisation and hardly any have chosen to go down this route. Although some multi-academy trusts have been successful, many haven't and some have been involved in financial scandals, failed OFSTEDs and controversies around lack of inclusion.

At Farfield, we strongly value the support, challenge and services that we get from the local authority and we are proud to be part of the Leeds Children's Services success story. Over 90% of Leeds primary schools are already good or better according to OFSTED and its Children's Services are held up as a model to other cities following a really positive OFSTED report last year. Much of Leeds' success is based on the cluster model of cooperation



between schools and local delivery of 'early help' services for children and families. This model is threatened by changes to school funding and forced academisation.

Academisation is being opposed by many Conservatives at a local

level across the country and let's hope the government is forced to back down or amend its plans. This proposal is an unwelcome distraction from our core mission to provide a great education for your child. I have written to the minister on behalf of Leeds Primary Headteacher Forum to oppose this move, but after six weeks the letter hasn't even yet been acknowledged. I have also written to local MP Stuart Andrew and got what seemed to be an unsympathetic response. Perhaps parents might like to contact him? <u>stuart.andrew.mp@parliament.uk</u>

Last term was typically busy on the sporting front with children competing in football, rugby, netball and cross country competitions. Year 4 benefitted from a series of lessons in Gaelic Football delivered by coaches from the Gaelic Football Association.

SATs this term for Y2 and Y6

This term our children in Years 2 and 6 will be taking their statutory assessments in reading and in maths. Expectations have been raised and new assessments have been drafted. At KS2, a formal calculations test has replaced mental arithmetic (we're not sure why) and the expectations around grammar have increased hugely in both Years 2 and 6. Children will be declared to have either reached the expected standard or not and the older children will get a standardised score for apparent progress from age 7.

We do have concerns about these new assessments, especially the changes to assessment of writing. Whilst 'levels' were previously a 'best-fit' judgement, children's writing now needs to meet every one of the attainment expectations: you could write as well as JK Rowling, but a relative weakness in handwriting or spelling might mean you were reported as not reaching the expected standard. Woe betide anyone in Y6 who fails to show they have control of active and passive voice in their writing...

Whatever happens, we will continue to celebrate the children's hard work and successes, help them learn from mistakes and support them with the next stages of their learning.

Phonics tests in Year 1

Phonics tests for Year 1 will take place in June, and some children in Year 2 will have a retest of their phonics skills if they were deemed not to have reached the required standard last year.

If children are mentioning reading nonsense or 'alien words' at school, this is part of the test. Examples of 'alien words' are cloin, jound and fape. Can the children use and apply their phonic skills with no context or word familiarity?

Baseline binned...

A new test for Reception children introduced last autumn has been abandoned already as the three different private providers were all deemed too different to make reasonable comparisons between schools. Well, there's a surprise.... As a headteacher union immediately stated: "It is hard to avoid saying 'we told you so'." Any chance of the school getting a refund from the government? Or getting back the valuable teaching time wasted when we should have been getting to know our new children? The incompetence is staggering.

Student writing project

We were delighted to welcome Tom Dobson and his students from Leeds Beckett University to Farfield again this year for a series of interesting and engaging writing workshops with children in Years 1, 3 and 6. Our strong relationships with a number of local higher education establishments continue to bring mutual benefits to them and to Farfield.

Domestic Violence notifications

Leeds schools have been given the opportunity to take part in a new project that will run jointly between schools and West Yorkshire Police. The project has been established to support children who are resident in households where there are incidents of domestic violence and abuse. We know that children can be significantly physically or emotionally hurt by being either present in the house or directly witnessing an incident of domestic violence.

The Domestic Violence and Abuse School Notification Project has been designed to provide confidential 'next day' notification to schools on any incidents of domestic violence and abuse which occur within a child's household that might have an impact on a child whilst they are in school.

The project will ensure that a member of the school staff is trained to allow them to use the information that has been shared, in confidence, and ensure that the school is able to make provision for possible difficulties experienced by children, or their families, who have been involved in or witnessed a domestic violence or abuse incident.

Food for Thought

Food is important for everyone. At Farfield, we take food seriously, growing food on Farfield Farm to provide children with horticultural skills, scientific understanding and an enhanced awareness of where their food might come from; providing an ambitious and rigorous cooking curriculum in KS2 and employing our own kitchen staff directly to take control of our own school meals.

Over the coming year we have more exciting plans for food in the school:

- Extension of a regular farming curriculum into Key Stage 1
- Extension of a regular cooking curriculum into Key Stage 1
- Review of the school's overall Food Policy

We would also like to reopen the school cafe this summer - do we have any volunteers who would like to take this on one afternoon a week, e.g. Fridays?

Most excitingly, we expect to soon be members of the **Fuel for School** scheme run by <u>The Real Junk Food</u> <u>Project</u>. If successful, we would aim to have a partnership with a local supermarket to receive and pass on 'food waste' on a 'pay as you feel' basis. Ideally, we would combine this with a re-opened cafe, harvests from the farm and eggs from the school chickens.

Food for Fuel already works very well in some other schools, including locally at Stanningley Primary School. Watch out for more information soon.

Now more than ever, children must have a broad awareness of a range of religions and should be given time to reflect on core ideas and beliefs.

I emailed parents about this work recently and was delighted at the offers of school visits that we received. We will aim to have a RE-related visit in each year group from September 2016.

I have had the pleasure of delivering a few RE lessons this year covering an absent colleague. The lessons that I delivered mainly related to Sikhism and it was really helpful to have Sikh children in the lesson to bring the learning to life: they were very well informed and keen to contribute and share. The rich cultural mix that we have at Farfield is a real strength of the school and is to everyone's benefit.
