

Ofsted visit us at last!

As you probably know, Ofsted finally paid us a visit. It was an exceptionally intense day but the inspection was relatively straight-forward and was a positive experience. We did not get a comprehensive report - this was a one day section 8 inspection that simply confirmed that we are still good school - but the inspector's letter did highlight the breadth of the curriculum, the very good behaviour of children and the great work of our staff. The inspector made a few recommendations for further improvements; these were reasonable and things that we had identified

and are working on anyway.



Everyone is pleased that the inspection went well and we can get on with providing our children with a great education!

We were very ready for the inspector and one of the things that stood out to me was the quality of the school's middle and senior leaders: they were able to swiftly and impressively answer any questions that the inspector posed. Thank you and well done!

Headteacher part time secondment

Following our successful OFSTED, I was approached to take on a part-time secondment with the local authority to support the director of children's services and his senior leadership team whilst there are vacancies at the top of their educational team. I am there to give a headteacher's perspective on policy, to act as a 'conduit' between the LA and schools and to work on a number of specific projects, for example to improve policy and practice around Personal Education Plans for Children Looked After by the local authority. I am now committing half my time to that role. Whilst I am not in school, David Cooke takes on the role of headteacher.

New School Business Manager

We are delighted to welcome Laura Marshall to Farfield as our new School Business Manager. Laura will only be working part time, but will take on the strategic leadership of non-academic elements of the school.

'Daily Mile' Update

We have run the furthest of all schools registered with 'Marathon Kids': a total of over 15,000 km! 203 children have run (or walked) the equivalent of at least one marathon, 40 have run two marathons and 5 children - Zakariyah and Peter Y3, Emelia, Rhys and Dev Y5 - have run more than the equivalent of three marathons since September! In fact, Emelia has run the equivalent of four marathons!

School News Pigs on Farfield Farm

We are planning to have a few pigs on the farm by the end of October. **These will not be pets**; they will be bred by our partners Meanwood Valley Urban Farm, we will 'grow them on' and MVUF will collect them for slaughter. The carcasses will be prepared by a local butcher and the meat will be available to order.

The pigs will be housed in the fenced off area by the wind turbine. The children will be able to view the pigs from outside.

Feeding will be possible by pouring feed down chutes into the troughs. Most children, especially younger children, won't be handling the pigs at all, and it will be optional for all where there are cultural sensitivities. The pigs won't be officially named so as to minimise attachment.

Having pigs on the farm will raise children's awareness of animal welfare issues and the provenance of their food. We hope that the pigs will benefit from high standards of animal welfare and plenty of space to act naturally.

We have been successful in our application for an Awards for All Lottery award of $\pounds 10,000$. This will supplement school and PTA funds (and a parental donation) so that we can progress with plans to replace the trim trails that were removed last summer. We will not be replacing likewith-like but we think that the children will enjoy the developments that are being planned that will provide opportunities for the development of upper body strength. Some of the lottery grant is for works for the pigs enclosure.

Regular volunteers from Lloyds Banking provide super support for our Y4-6 coding curriculum and a brilliant volunteer group from Barclays came to Farfield Farm last half term to repair rotten raised beds and replace the tool shed.

Budget Challenges

The school will be running a significant in-year budget deficit again this financial year. We have suffered significant cuts to our SEND budget and our expected gains from the new National Funding Formula have been capped. We are using school balances to protect school provision in the medium term but this level of funding is not sustainable in the longer term.

RAF 100 celebrations



Just before Easter, we hosted a fantastic event to mark the 100th anniversary of the Royal Air Force. We were joined by the mayor, local historians, members of the RAF and other guests for a morning of educational activities around the history of the RAF and it culminated in a service in the graveyard of St John's church for remembrance of the Capt. Butler: a local man who was part of the Royal Flying Corp and who died in an air crash in WW1. This was the national launch of the schools' programme for RAF100, led by a London-based group called Big Ideas. It was an honour to have been chosen.

Whilst only a couple of classes could be accommodated in the event, almost every child did contribute through the production of hundreds of paper planes, each of which bore the name of an airman lost in WW1.
