



Aims and Objectives

Aim

Understanding how technology may facilitate sexual offending among adolescents poses practitioners with many unique challenges. The Technology-Assisted Harmful Sexual Behaviour practice guidance*, which accompanies this training is intended to help practitioners better formulate judgments about risks in the context of concerns arising from an adolescent's technology-assisted harmful sexual behaviours.

The practice guidance is drawn from research findings and current practice knowledge. Importantly, it will provide practitioners with knowledge of the impact this form of child sexual abuse has on victims.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course participants will:

- Have an understanding of current research findings regarding technology assisted child sexual abuse
- Know how to collect and collate relevant information regarding TA-HSB
- Learn how to develop a case formulation
- Be confident in establishing safety plans

AIM INTERVENTIONS FOR ADOLESCENTS

31 October/1 November 2018

PARTICIPANTS: Social workers, YOT workers, Children's charities representatives, health professionals, education staff and others working in the field of child protection Delegates must have good knowledge base of AIM2 assessments to do this course.

Aim:

The intervention course is to address how workers can structure individual bespoke intervention packages for young people based on the assessment outcomes, recognising that the intervention will be unique to each individual young person. It is necessary to recognise the systems around the young person and the very important roles that they play.

Objectives:

- To explore both the personal and professional attitudes, beliefs and values which underpin this work
- To look at developing a bespoke intervention package using an AIM 2 assessment case study
- To identify the need for openness and transparency with all the systems around the young person
- To develop confidence in recognising the areas of work within the domains that need addressing and those that may not
- Recognising how attachments styles will impact on how the young person interacts within the process and how best, we as workers can manage this
- Tapping into our creativity how we as workers can make this work interesting and exciting for the young people that we work with.

Objectives:

To provide information from research and practice on why younger children may act in a sexual way

To introduce the AIM assessment model for younger children with frameworks for professional decision making, and give participants an opportunity to use them

To provide information on programmes of interventions with children, their families and their networks

To facilitate participants in trying out techniques for working with children and their families

To facilitate participants in linking the course information to their own practice


Understanding the Impact of Sibling Sexually Harmful Behaviour on Family Relationships and Exploring Appropriate Therapeutic Interventions

Aim:

To raise awareness of the existence of sibling sexually harmful behaviour and increase professional confidence in managing and responding therapeutically to these families

Objectives:

- To provide information from research and practice about the prevalence and characteristics of sibling sexually harmful behaviour
- To identify the family context where sibling sexually harmful behaviour is more likely to occur
- To discuss the responses to disclosures of sibling sexually harmful behaviour with particular reference to denial and minimisation
- To explore the impact of sibling sexually harmful behaviour on the victim, perpetrator and family relationships
- · To explore safety issues that arise in these families
- With the assistance of case studies to explore the treatment approaches available including the usefulness of a restorative justice approach
- To highlight the importance of inter-agency and multi-disciplinary working


