September 2024 will be a challenge for us as there are reported to be less than 30 children of the requisite age for whom we are the nearest school. As usual, we will need to show off our school to prospective families to attract more children to our school. We have a space in **current** Year 4 and **current** Y5, as well as a few spaces in **current** Reception if anyone would like to transfer to us. Other year groups are full.

Punctuality Matters!

Post-COVID, school attendance at Farfield and across the country is down but is slowly recovering.

Punctuality is much worse. This week, many families will get letters about this including our estimate of the lost learning for each child based on minutes late. One child has missed over 1000 minutes this year due to lateness! At primary schools, lateness is almost always the fault of the parent.

Lateness is a really bad habit: it is disrespectful to staff and harms all children's learning. Every late child takes



administrators' time and disrupts a lesson. Very occasional lateness is understandable but a minority of families are habitually 10 or 20 minutes late. This is not acceptable.

The junior school starts at 8.40 and the infants starts at 8.45. Please do try to arrive on time.

Our fabulous PTA continue to run brilliant events and raise lots of money for school. Recently, the PTA provided new playtime equipment for both buildings which is proving very popular.
